Pastor's Commentary

"Other generations in church got to do what their parents did... We are not so lucky"

–Diana Butler Bass

Well, I hope I have that quote right...at least paraphrased appropriately. I heard it as a passing remark as she was leading a discussion in a group called "Emerging Leaders"... this was many years ago, when I was still "emerging" I suppose. (Does that mean I am "submerging" now?) –Not here, not now...I sure don't feel like I'm sinking at United Protestant Church. Oh, sure I'm engulfed with a desk full of papers, but that's more to do with my organizational habits. Within that clutter, though, what's most exciting, is my church "to do" list, well over a page in length, gleaned from the thoughts and ideas shared by many members in many conversations, and all centered on what feels like--to many of us--an interesting time of transition here at U.P. Church.

See, I've been having fun writing the "Toward Sunday" column in the weekly reminders email, and love the responses I receive, but this space in the newsletter is different. Here, it is better that I offer a summary about church life. So how's this for a summary:

Our church rose up to accommodate the want for a Protestant Church in a Model Community for US Steel. This was a time when participation and membership in a church felt obligatory for many, so the church thrived. In this context, it could be said that for many years, the "mission" of the church was to accommodate the religious desires of a specific culture and class of people in a unique time and place in history. The generations pass. The industries close. Most people move away. Our elders pass away and the newer generations, for the most part, no longer feel a sense of obligation to attend church, rather seek "relevance" to their new and different lives and questions of faith. During this time, small but faithful number of people commit to sustaining the church. The most recent pastor is hired. (A quirky fellow ... a bit overly-verbose and idealistic, and his jokes aren't really that funny, but I guess he's nice and he has a lot of energy). One significant charge given to this new pastor is to "engage the community", which he does with some gusto (remember that "overly-verbose" part?), and begins to invite the present wants and needs of the community—honoring the initial "mission" of the church—into our everyday life as a church. Problem is: the community has changed, and what people in the community are seeking from a church has changed...

...Or has it? Acceptance and love of Jesus and celebration of God does not change. But as I like to say: accepting Jesus into your heart is like learning to walk. It is a great first step. Now, Jesus invites you to set out on a journey with him. See, there are many churches out there that consider that first step the *only* step. And there are many people (of quite similar class and culture that once inhabited Morgan Park) that flock to such churches...*contemporary music, lots of things for kids to do, coffee shop in the sanctuary... cool.* It accommodates the wants, but...

...But what about the rest of Jesus's teaching and action? Those things he shared and the miracles of healing and grace he performed when he set out into communities with his disciples? That recognition of the "other" that Jesus so often refers to, you know, the one that was once reviled, derided, or feared? What about those messages of turning our previous understanding of social order on its head? The "exalted being humbled" and the "humbled exalted"? You know... all those things we've been talking about in Luke in recent weeks?

Friends, that's where we are. In a community that has changed and a culture of Christianity that seems to want to stop at the first "accept Jesus" step and call everything well and done. And it may have been our way in the past in this church, and it may have worked at that time... but (and this is where that quote on top comes in: "Other generations in church got to do what their parents did... We are not so lucky") as we sustain our mission of accommodating the community and honor our present "reason for being", we'll do well to take a closer look at all those words in the Gospel of Luke we've been reading week by week about social order and the presence of God in those "others" that aren't like us. We're on a journey with Jesus, after all, and he's going to stir our souls whether we like it or not!

...And that's why I get excited about that long "to do" list I mentioned earlier. The list has a lot of examples of love, spirit, celebration, creativity, and care. I'll do my part to be wind in the sails when our people are called to ministry. I'll laugh with you, cry with you, study scripture and pray and serve with you. I just ask that you all be open to the new thing God is doing, both in the church and in your own soul!
