# HAPPY VALENTINE'S DAY

### **Pastor's Commentary**

Not a numbers guy, really... and at any rate it's hard to quantify the Spirit I've felt here in the past year - fresh and light, in comparison to last year at this time. We're praying and playing and caring and sharing quite well. I thank God for that. This year, we have seasoned ourselves with the spices God has given us, and responded to our hunger for a new experience to consume our Spirit. Abstract and colorful words? You betcha! After all, when you're doing a new thing, not a lot of specifics will suffice.

Context: It is important to recall that our church was created back near 1920 with a corporate sponsor as our benefactor. We were created as a Protestant church for the employees of the steel mill - as another part of an intentional community built by U.S. Steel. We sustained ourselves with a population that felt a desire, if not a responsibility, to attend weekly worship and to belong to a church.

Times change. Communities change. We've had a dedicated few that sustained the church during this transition. For them, we hold the Christ light and give prayerful thanks! By their effort, they have gifted us the opportunity that we have now.

A year ago, I could not tell you that it was God's will that this church grow and thrive. At the time, six months on the job, my "honeymoon" period was rapidly ending and I was facing the natural product of a church where a small group of people had been doing beyond the lion's share of decision-making and effort to keep things going. I sought, with a Pastor's vocation of research and prayer, to prepare this place for the potential growth waiting in the wings of this community. There was resistance, of course, from those that were used to the "way things were" but the majority of our community held strong in spirit, believing in hope.

See, if at one time we can name that we were "the Protestant Church for the U.S. Steel Community", we can accept that at the time we were a community church for a specific class, culture, and race of people. And now, we must also acknowledge that the class, culture, and racial background of our community have drastically changed. By my experience engaging this community (as I was charged to do in accepting this position), I can tell you that it is a community hungry for faith and connection. It is a community that longs to see our open doors and welcome.

And here I lift up what I shared in our New Members Inquiry meeting a few weeks ago: we are a "United Protestant Church" with a mission to welcome and include members of the Protestant faith all across the spectrum of faith traditions, cultural backgrounds, and socio-political values. As I shared in my sermon two weeks ago: "we have both Bernie and Trump supporters among us." This echoes our denominational ties, as well as my commitment as an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ (UCC), echoing one of their maxims: "No matter where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here."

So many different people! Can we get along? Honestly, it remains to be seen, but my instinct is "you betcha!" To this end, I challenge the long-term members to welcome new members with love and inclusion, trusting that God, as presented in the Gospel message, seeks for all of us to be equal. I challenge new members to realize they are participating in a new and exciting that God is doing.

I make it my practice to focus on the "yes" instead of the "no", and to look toward the present and prepare for the future rather than to linger in the past. At one time we thought we might be near to closing our doors. At present, we are growing... slowly but surely. I have been told that the last Christmas service was the largest in over twenty years, and that this is the first time in a long time we have had new members welcomed two years in a row. That's nice to hear, but I want to circle back to my introduction and tell you that it is the Holy Spirit in the place that matters the most for me. Positive energy. Engagement of faith. The Holy Spirit at work and thriving. That is what matters to me.

So to summarize: the ecclesiastical work of the year ahead is to adjust our organizational structure and our default behavior of over twenty years in order to welcome active participation of new members from our community in the day-to-day ministry and operations of the church. Our work ahead is to prepare for the growth that I truly believe will happen. Does it look like that church of old? No. But I thank God for the people who sustained us, that God brought us to the gift of this present moment.

- \*Weekly reminders of upcoming events are now available by email and hard copy. I look forward to receiving this reminder. Thanks to Clarice and Paul!
- \*Our church kitchen was used by a group of us for making donuts and Christmas cookies. The donuts were made earlier in the year, the Christmas cookies were made just before the Bill Bastian concert and sold at the concert. Along with our normal annual events, you can see that it's been a very busy year.

It seems that our church is showing a real presence in our community, not only with these added events, but with the spirit of our sharing. Thank you to everyone who has worked so hard this past year. I can see good things ahead for us. God be with us all.
